








The Hub at Wintringham

An important part of the future of the eastern expansion of St Neots, The Hub at Wintringham will provide the main centre for shops, services and leisure amenities within the development. It will also support the existing and planned growth of Love's Farm.







The Hub at Wintringham is divided into three zones:

- Northern (A): M&S Food, shops, office/co-working space and a café/eatery – in planning
- Central (B): nursery, health centre, community centre and library - in design
- Southern (C): David Lloyd Club in construction

The Hub at Wintringham will be delivered in phases over the next 5-6 years.

PLANS SUBMITTED FOR NEW COMMUNITY FACILITIES

Following extensive stakeholder and community engagement, plans have been submitted for a new M&S Food, shops, offices/co-working space and a café/eatery set around a public square in the northern zone of The Hub at Wintringham.

The smaller shops have been designed to enable independent retailers to sit alongside the new M&S Food to give shoppers a variety of choice, whilst the new café/eatery is expected to provide a range of snacks and refreshments as well as a more extensive menu.

Plans for The Hub at Wintringham have been informed by the development's Design Code, shaped by residents and inspired by the earlier archaeological discovery of an Iron Age settlement in the immediate vicinity of the site. The undulating roofline of Iron Age roundhouses is reflected in the design of the three key buildings, creating a striking landmark at the gateway of the development, and echoes of archaeological finds are found in the timber circular seating and public realm materials and design.

The buildings have been designed with an emphasis on energy and carbon efficient materials and systems, with the need for fossil fuels eliminated through the use of fully electric air conditioning and hot water systems as well as mechanical heat recovery ventilation.

Accessible green spaces and features for people of all ages and abilities have also been designed into The Hub. This will help create a welcoming place that encourages people to explore and feel connected. Informal play opportunities such as boulders, stepping stones and interactive landscape features will engage children and families, while seating will provide opportunities to pause, socialise or simply sit and watch life unfold. Lighting in the shared spaces has also been designed to provide a welcoming nighttime experience, while respecting neighbours and nature.

Subject to planning consent work will start onsite early next year, with the new M&S Food expected to open mid-2027.



Around Wintringham



DAVID LLOYD CLUB CONSTRUCTION UNDERWAY

Work has started on the new David Lloyd health, fitness and wellness club in the southern zone.

The site has been levelled and the earthworks completed, the outdoor swimming pool has been dug, and foundations installed. During late November/December, the steel works will go in to form the frame for the new club building and the indoor swimming pool will be dug. The car park will also be tarmacked. In the new year, once the roofing and cladding have gone on and the building is watertight, the internal fit out can start.

The family-friendly club will include a state-of-the-art gym, heated indoor and outdoor swimming pools, exercise studios, soft play, racquet sport facilities and a spa.

In addition to match-quality tennis, pickleball and badminton courts, the Club will offer the latest racquet sport to take the UK by storm - padel. The Premium Club will also feature a luxury Spa Retreat with Spa Garden.

The Club will also feature a Clubroom for members to meet with friends or enjoy a bite to eat, as well as large and inviting spaces to work, relax and socialise. A range of facilities for children is also proposed including a creche, soft play and spaces for after-school and holiday clubs, offering fun and active childcare solutions for parents outside of school hours.

Other elements include a 240-space car park with disabled, parent and child, and EV charging bays, as well as cycle spaces.

Stuart Caswell, New Clubs Acquisitions Director at David Lloyd Clubs said: "We're excited to join the new Wintringham community and to offer a fantastic health and wellness facility for all ages, as well as creating new jobs for local people. We look forward to opening our doors and welcoming new members next autumn."

Phase 2



The next phase of Wintringham covers the area between Wintringham Brook and Hen Brook and will include around 900 homes, a 2 form entry primary school, local facilities, open space, sport and recreation facilities and a network of new footpaths, cycleways and bridleways that connect to the rest of Wintringham and into St Neots.

In 2026, the project team will be submitting planning applications for the Design Code and infrastructure works to prepare for the first new homes coming forward, which are expected to be available in Spring/Summer 2027.

We'll keep you updated as plans progress.

The Wintringham Wagtail

Explore Wintringham Waters

It is a great time to wrap up warm and explore some of the fantastic nature spots around St Neots. This includes Wintringham Waters, three lakes along the southern boundary of the first phase of the development, designed so residents and visitors can immerse themselves in nature without disturbing it.

The lakes form a rich mosaic of habitats that link into the adjacent Wintringham Brook and wider nature corridors, creating a thriving network of biodiversity and a peaceful retreat. Follow the sandstone footpaths surrounding the lakes to explore the water's edge, watch the wildlife from one of the bird hides or pause on a bench to take in the scenery.

The bird hides will include information panels to help identify the variety of species expected to frequent the Waters throughout the year. To support birds through the winter months and enhance wildlife viewing, bird feeders have been placed close to the bird hides, enabling visitors to quietly observe birds at close range without scaring them away.

The paths around Wintringham Waters link into the wider leisure trail, providing a route of approximately 4km around the first phase of the development that will be extended to around 9km as future phases are rolled out.

Wayfinding boards provide an opportunity to discover more about Wintringham, its heritage and nature. This includes the variety of trees planted and the fruit you can snack on as you explore, as well as the different habitats – from grasslands to wetland meadows and brooks to woodland – and the species they support.

Paul Murfin, Communications and Partnerships Manager for Wintringham, said: "We know that being in nature is incredibly important for our health and wellbeing, and at Wintringham we're creating spaces for people and nature to live in harmony.

VOLUNTEERS WANTED

"These wonderful lakes at Wintringham Waters give residents and visitors an opportunity to get close to nature without disturbing birds and other sensitive species.

So, whether by yourself or with friends and family, grab your coat and walking boots or running shoes, and enjoy exploring this fantastic space. Well behaved dogs on leads are also welcome."

Wintringham Waters has been specially designed with habitats for more sensitive species away from the paths, including on islands in the lakes, where they can enjoy feeding and resting away from people. Please stick to the paths and keep dogs on a short lead.



INTRODUCING ROCK 'N ROLL BIRDER



Supporting active and sustainable travel

Wintringham has been designed to encourage a healthy, sustainable lifestyle with the right infrastructure and services being put in place for people to lead low carbon lives as the development rolls out.



smart journeys, the Sustainable Travel Planning Team hosted by Cambridgeshire County Council, is supporting Wintringham residents to choose cycling, walking and catching the bus over using their car: improving their health and decreasing their carbon footprint.

PERSONALISED TRAVEL PLANNING

smart journeys offer Wintringham residents 1-2-1 personalised travel planning sessions designed to explore sustainable and active travel options available to them.

PEDAL POWER

Wintringham has an extensive network of cycle paths throughout the development that link into St Neots and the surrounding area, and *smart journeys* has a range of initiatives to help residents get out and about by bike.

Wintringham residents have access to a range of free initiatives including 1-2-1 cycle training, bike servicing and repairs, and bike maintenance training.

Those buying bicycles as Christmas gifts, or as part of a New Year's resolution to be more active, were also able to book a free bike building session so they were pedal-ready for the holidays.

CAR SHARING

To help reduce the number of car journeys at Wintingham, the lift sharing App – MobilityWays – has been introduced to Wintingham.

MobilityWays supports new and existing residents in the area to car share by finding matches with other people living locally and travelling to/from similar destinations—as a driver, passenger or both. As more members join, there will be more potential matches!

Lift sharing helps you to:

• Save money — share the ride and split the costs. A typical commuter will save over £1,000 a year!

- Reduce CO2 emissions be part of the bigger picture to help improve air quality in your area by simply sharing your commute with someone else going your way.
- Reduce stress by cutting congestion and having some company on your journey.

If you haven't already joined, simply follow the steps below:

- 1 Download the Mobilityways App
- 2 Open the App and 'Search for a community to join'
- 3 Search for 'Urban&Civic' and click to join 'Wintringham Liftshare'
- 4 Join with your email or sign in with Apple or Facebook
- **5** Add in your details, i.e. your journey, if you are a driver or passenger (or both)
- 6 Let the App do the rest and find potential matches!

Once you've found someone suitable, introduce yourself and arrange how and when to meet. Please do not share your home address; meet at the end of a road or at a local landmark like a post box.

To support the use of car sharing throughout the festive period, Mobility Ways is running a 'Gift A Lift' campaign for those signed up to Liftshare, with two raffles for £250 of vouchers.

ANNUAL TRAVEL SURVEY

Each October, *smart journeys* carry out an annual travel survey to find out more about travel choices of people living at Wintringham and gain a better understanding of the barriers that prevent commuters from using more sustainable modes of transport.

The data collected helps influence future transport decisions and public transport improvements across the local area. It will also be used to inform future travel incentives *smart journeys* offer to Wintringham residents.

Next year, smart journeys will be working with Wintringham's design team to create a sustainable travel area in the northern zone of The Hub at Wintringham, near the new M&S Food. They will be using the data from the recent travel survey to create a space that is bespoke to Wintringham residents' needs such as hire bikes, a car club and a relaxing place to wait for a bus.

Update on A428 improvement works

The A1, A421 and A428 around Black Cat roundabout (Bedfordshire) and Caxton Gibbet roundabout (Cambridgeshire) are well known for heavy traffic and frequent delays. To facilitate quicker, safer and more reliable journeys for thousands of road users every day, National Highways is providing a new 10-mile dual carriageway and upgrades to Black Cat and Caxton Gibbet junctions.



Once complete, journeys at peak times are expected to be cut by up to 10 minutes. This will save businesses and road users an hour and a half in travel time over a working week.

We asked the team coordinating these works for an update on progress.

HITTING THE HALFWAY MARK ON THE A428 BLACK CAT TO CAXTON GIBBET IMPROVEMENTS

October brought an exciting milestone in our region's biggest road project, with the A428 Black Cat to Caxton Gibbet Improvements officially reaching the halfway point in its construction journey. This is a major achievement for the scheme, which is set to transform travel across Bedfordshire and Cambridgeshire, including right here in St Neots.

TACKLING A LONG-STANDING BOTTLENECK

For years, the single-carriageway stretch of the A428 between St Neots and Caxton Gibbet has been a notorious pinch point, with long delays and unpredictable journey times - especially during rush hour or after an incident. Locals know all too well how frustrating it can be.

Now, that's changing. Since work began in late 2023, progress along the route of the new 10-mile dual carriageway has been remarkable. From major earthworks to bridge construction, every milestone brings us closer to smoother, safer and more reliable journeys for thousands of drivers each day.

At the heart of the project are three key locations: the upgraded Black Cat junction, the new Cambridge Road (St Neots) junction and improvements around Caxton Gibbet roundabout. These sites are already taking shape, with visible progress for residents and regular road users alike.

MILESTONES ACHIEVED SO FAR

The team has moved an incredible 7.1 million tonnes of earth to lay the foundations for the dual carriageway, link roads and supporting structures - the equivalent of more than seven billion standard bags of baking flour!

To date, 60,000 tonnes of asphalt have been laid across key areas, creating smooth new road surfaces around Black Cat, Cambridge Road, Eltisley and Caxton Gibbet.

Behind the scenes, a huge amount of utility work has been completed too. More than 27 miles of broadband, gas, water and power lines have been successfully diverted - that's roughly a nine-hour walk if you were to cover it on foot!

Construction teams have also lifted 84 bridge beams into place across 13 new structures, with a total of 18 bridges planned once the scheme is complete. To support the new road, 25 miles of new drainage systems have been installed so far.

At £1 billion, this is the largest road infrastructure project currently under construction in the country.

As National Highways celebrate this important halfway milestone, work continues at full speed. Once complete, the A428 improvements will not only make journeys easier but also strengthen connections between our growing communities - from St Neots to Cambridge and beyond.









It's brilliant to see how much has been delivered as we are now at the halfway point in construction. Already motorists who regularly travel on the route will see major visible changes. It's a powerful testament to the hard work, expertise and dedication of everyone involved, and means we remain on track to open in spring 2027.

The end result will be a smoother, safer and more free-flowing road network. This is now firmly in sight and we're grateful for the ongoing understanding and support from the local community and road users.

WINTRINGHAM ON WHEELS

This year's cycle-themed community fun day -Wintringham on Wheels - returned with a packed programme to showcase and develop skills, service bikes, support security and encourage residents to get pedalling.

From high-flying BMX stunt displays to pedal-powered smoothies and practical support, the event catered for all ages, abilities and interests.

Highlights included jaw-dropping BMX performances, complete with obstacle jumps and daring tricks - including jumping over a willing assistant lying on the ground! Children also had the chance to take part in a BMX workshop, inspiring the next generation of riders.

Attendees also had an opportunity to try out electric bicycles courtesy of App Bikes, and Cambridgeshire County Council's road safety team encouraged children to cycle smart and safely with fun and interactive activities.

For bicycle owners, Dr Bike held free bike repair and servicing sessions to check tyres, brakes and lights to ensure bikes were roadworthy and ready for long summer cycle rides. Security was a top priority too, with the local Transport Police and PCSOs providing free security bike marking and advice.

Adding a fun and tasty twist, Wintringham's travel planning partner smart journeys brought along a smoothie bike so that thirsty attendees could blend healthy drinks through pedal power! Meanwhile, Perky Beans mobile barista was on hand with a delicious range of beverages, refreshments and cakes.


Organised by Wintringham Residents' Association and supported by Urban&Civic, the event was held at Wintringham Primary Academy, at the heart of the community.

Exciting times for St Neots town centre

Town and District Councillor Ben Pitt provides an update on the ongoing efforts to transform St Neots town centre.

When I last provided an update on St Neots town centre – in the Winter 2024 edition of The Wagtail – the Market Square and Priory Centre were both closed for refurbishment. So, while there were lots of exciting plans, there wasn't yet much to show for it.

A year on, I'm delighted to say that there has been some tangible progress. The Market Square refurbishment is now complete, and the quality of the paving, seating, planting and drainage is massively improved.

The refurbishments have come in for flak on social media, with some labelling it 'a £15m patio'. For the record, the £15 million budget was for four projects — the Market Square, High Street improvements, the Falcon Hotel and Priory Centre. A lot of the budget for the Square was spent underground on flood alleviation. However, I recognise that it's not so much the appearance of a place that defines it, but rather people's relationship with it. That's why I'm committed to ensuring that the Market Square is used regularly as the cultural and civic heart of the town.

The Town Council ran a weekend of activities in May to mark the reopening of the Square, with live music, a film screening, carnival games, fairytale-themed children's activities and lots of market stalls. It was wonderful to see the Square packed with people once again.

The Market entertainment is back, accompanying the Farm & Craft Market, on the second and fourth Saturdays of the month. Since September there's been soul, jazz, musical theatre and a pottery workshop.

On 13 December we enjoyed some Christmas craft activities accompanied by festive songs from students from Stageworks performing arts school. Head down on 20 December – note the change of date from the normal schedule – as Bedford Brass Band will be filling the Square with yuletide tunes. I love a brass band at Christmas!



The Market Entertainment programme is partly about creating a pleasant atmosphere for people visiting the Farm & Craft Market, but it also gives people a reason to come into town. There are some wonderful stalls offering local produce, handmade gifts and hot food. However, the entertainment means you don't need to spend anything to enjoy the town centre. It's a great opportunity to meet other people, spark up a conversation and start to put down roots in our beautiful town.

I'm continuing to work hard behind the scenes to increase the number of events on the Market Square – watch this space or get in touch if you have an idea!

The Priory Centre remains closed for refurbishment, but the Town Council has relocated to Priory New Street and the Eatons Centre to host a wide range of community groups. Work on the Priory Centre is making good progress. It's unrecognisable on the inside – stripped back to its shell as internal walls are redesigned, a balcony is installed to increase its seating capacity and various extensions are built. What was once a well-used but rather tired community centre is set to be a landmark venue with a genuinely exciting programme of music, theatre, community activities, a restaurant, bar and much more besides. It's set to reopen in autumn 2026.

The Town Council has green-lit a new splash park with £650,000 of funding. It's currently under construction on the land between Eat'n'Bowl and Priory Park. It's being delivered by an independent charity and is due to open in spring 2026.

Last December, the Town Council secured central government funding to purchase the Oast House, a beautiful, listed building in the centre of town that has sat empty for almost 10 years. The Council is working with an architect to develop plans to turn it into a community asset. Developing the site is not without its challenges, but it's a key heritage landmark for the town that deserves a bright future. I'm really looking forward to sharing the work done to date and inviting local residents to help shape the next chapter in the building's life.
